Studies seeking participants

Caroline Baker from La Trobe University in Melbourne is seeking expressions of interest from health professionals with expertise in **aphasia** and/or provision of **psychological care** for people with acquired brain injury to participate in a new study (at least 2 years of experience working with people with aphasia). The study aims to develop a clinician competency rating tool to facilitate psychological interventions after aphasia. They invite participants to be involved in an **e-Delphi consensus process via email** (total time 30-45 mins across up to 3 rounds to rate competency items). Abbey Fletcher, a PhD student at the University of Sunderland, is undertaking research into the perspectives of stroke survivors, their carers, and professionals on currently available **stroke rehabilitation services**. She is looking for adults from each of these categories to take part in a **questionnaire study**. Stroke survivors who take part should be at least 6 months post-stroke, with no cognitive impairment that would prevent them from giving full informed consent. 
Free webinars on clinical research
