Study results on dementia after stroke

Informing Patients with Acute Stroke About their Risk of Dementia: A Survey of UK Healthcare Professionals

Objectives: Cognitive problems following stroke are of key concern to stroke survivors. Discussing risk of dementia at the time of stroke could have implications for follow-up care. However, informing someone who has just had a stroke about risk

Last year, we asked for your help in completing a survey on informing patients about the risk of dementia after stroke. Emily Ball and her colleagues have now published their findings. The key results are: Healthcare professionals are generally aware of risk factors for post-stroke dementia, but do not routinely discuss it with patients. They think it could be helpful to discuss risk of 1-6 months after stroke. They said carers were more likely than patients to ask about risk of dementia.
